



DRAWING NARRATIV teatures work by thirteen artists who reference the visual language of cartoonszines, children books and the graphic novel. Their paintings, prints, collages, drawings, and animations literally Odraw their narrative from the Pgure, landscape, abstraction, and surreal events.

This interactive guide is intended to encourage discussion about the visual narrative developed by these, for the most part, younger artists. As you explore the exhibition, you may Pnd surprising twists and turns which also reßect our own memories, biases, and assumptions.

If there are any conßicts or problems between the characters in your story how might they be resolved?


